From the Principal ...

30 May

This week we've marked National Reconciliation Week (NRW) with a special reflection in morning homeroom. NRW is celebrated across Australia each year between 27th May and 3rd June. The week is framed by two significant events which provide a strong symbol for the aspirations of reconciliation.

27th May, 1967 is the anniversary of Australia's most successful referendum and is a defining event in our nation's history. The referendum saw over 90 per cent of Australians vote to give the Commonwealth the power to make laws for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and to recognise them in the national census.

3rd June, 1992 marks the High Court of Australia's Mabo decision which legally recognised that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples have a special relationship to the land; that this existed prior to colonization and still exists today. This paved the way for Native Title land rights.

NRW is a time for all Australians to reflect on how each of us can contribute to the national reconciliation effort.

Feast of the Ascension

This Sunday is the Feast of the Ascension. In leaving his earthly life Jesus hands over the day to day work of the Kingdom of God to his followers and through them to all people of faith. It is our hands that do the heavy lifting today.

People hear his words through us, see his world through

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us and experience his love through us. We can only promote the dignity of all people and address issues of peace and justice if we all walk the talk as Jesus did, if we put our words into action. Developing respectful relationships between the broader Australian community and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples is one of the many realms where we need to do this.

Stay Smart Online Week (2nd – 6th June)

Just this week eBay users received notification to change their passwords due to a breach of security. This is a timely reminder for all of us of the need to better understand how to stay safe and secure in the online world. Many of us, even young people who are technologically savvy, know very little about online risks and how best to manage them.

Next week is Stay Smart Online Week. It aims to help Australians using the internet – whether at home, the workplace or school to understand the simple steps that can be taken to protect themselves and their information online.

This year's theme - 'On The Go' - reflects the importance of staying safe and secure online while using mobile devices when social networking, banking, shopping, and navigating the internet.

How do Emotions Affect Our Daily Life?

Family tone is usually impacted by the emotions and mood of parents.



Emotions or mood?

Emotions are short, more intense bursts of feeling. Moods are emotions that linger longer but are less intense. Nothing wrong with negative emotions. In fact, feeling sad is just as normal and healthy as feeling happy.

Some negative emotions become toxic if they aren't curbed or contained, impacting heavily on the long-term family tone. They become the family's default mood.

Children's emotions also impact heavily on the mood in families, but one of your basic tasks as a parent is to do your best to lift yourself above the emotions of children and spread a healthy mood.

It's not easy, but it's important that you do. Michael Grose, Happy Kids, www.parentingideas.com.au **Anger** creates tension especially when it simmers just below the surface. Kids go into their shells when anger is near, because they feel unsafe. Fear accompanies parent anger.

Grumpiness makes kids switch off parents. It's also **Scepticism** leads to cynicism and a hardening of the empathy arteries. Scepticism is sneezed, spreading germs everywhere.

Gratitude spreads quickly, lifting everyone who receives it. Family tone quickly lightens when gratitude is expressed.

Calm falls on a family like blanket instantly increasing family security and contentment. It too spreads but quietly.

Enthusiasm lifts the spirit, making everything seem possible. Most children are naturally attracted to enthusiasm, as it offers hope and inspiration.



In the Vegie Patch

Some of you may have noticed a vegie patch growing beside the LOTE centre. This has been created by the work of Year 8 students as part of the Particip8 Program. Students have been moving soil, planting seeds and seedlings, mulching, composting and feeding worms. Yes! Vegetable waste has been collected to feed about 1000 worms. The vegetables love 'worm tea' and that explains why our broad beans,



broccolis, lettuce, beetroots, cauliflowers and herbs are growing big and strong. This week ten students from Year 8 (Kiir Jerry, Tayla Lane, Vivian Truong, Patricia Dabu, Jarod Tiquia, Okilo Dimo, Matthew Tufuga, Charles Endaya, Nyajuma Akoul, Joseph Manyror) formed a group to discuss how best to make the vegie patch a shared, sustainable, educational and ongoing resource. The group has yet to give themselves a name; however, they have a vision for the garden. These students are proud that the produce from the garden will be largely donated to the Holy Eucharist food collection. These students have agreed to meet regularly to ensure the garden is a long-term project. Already these students have identified community involvement as necessary for the success of the garden and will be asking for support from family and friends for practical contributions along the way. The next task for the group is to, by next week, assemble a hot house for our seedlings.
