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Principal's Report

Each year World Environment Day is celebrated on 5 June. This day is a platform for awareness raising and action.

The 2018 theme "Beat Plastic Pollution" focuses on the waste created through single use plastics such as disposable straws, food wrappers, bottle tops, shopping bags, cups and plastic drink bottles. Whilst convenient, these items end up in landfill or in the ocean where they choke marine life and create an awful 'plastic soup'. Plastic often ends up in the rubbish within minutes of purchase. About a third of all plastic waste is from single use plastics.

According to the World Environment day website, "Every year, up to 13 million tons of plastic leak into our oceans, where it smothers coral reefs and threatens vulnerable marine wildlife. The plastic that ends up in the oceans can circle the Earth four times in a single year, and it can persist for up to 1,000 years before it fully disintegrates." Consumed by livestock or sea creatures, the plastic also finds its way into our food chain.

During the coming week it might be interesting for all of us to think about applying the 'if you can't reuse it, refuse It' principle to our actions and purchases.

Intercampus Mass and Afternoon Tea

Last Friday we were delighted to host staff from all campuses of Catholic Regional College for mass and afternoon tea. Global Day of Prayer to end Famine

World Council of Churches (WCC) and other faith partners will join together in a Global Day of Prayer on Sunday, 10 June to end famine.

More than 20 million people are at risk of starvation across Somalia, Yemen, Nigeria and South Sudan. Globally, millions more suffer from drought and food shortages with one person in every nine people short of enough food to lead a healthy, active life.

Chronic hunger is increasing around the world and food crises are spreading and intensifying, according to a new report 'World Food Assistance, Preventing Food Crises' by the World Food Programme (WFP).

It asks what causes these problems to break out, what determines their scale and how they might be prevented. In summary: 'It is clear what needs to be done to prevent food crises. The world must first address their principal causes conflict and extreme weather events related to climate change. Where chronic hunger and malnutrition are addressed, and food systems are functioning well, people are better able to cope with shocks like war or drought. And where strong political, social and

economic structures are in place, food crises are less severe and shorter-lived.' Let us pray and work for international action: to tackle the factors causing famine, to commit sufficient and timely financial support and to working for peace.

Wednesday Mass

Through the celebration of the Eucharist, Jesus Christ is made present to the Christian community to give them life, to heal them and to form them as a people. Christians can discover and express most clearly who they are and who they are called to be as they enter into these celebrations. Year 7 Students are examining the lituray in greater detail this term and have undertaken the preparation and the running of a Wednesday morning mass. 7 Yarra and 7 Wimmera have run their masses successfully and 7 Snowy and 7 Kiewa will run next week's Wednesday mass. Wednesday Mass is a significant reminder of how as a school community we build and express the life of the Christians.

Year 9

Year 9 students start Exams on Tuesday 12th June. They will have one exam per day during the first 2 periods followed by normal classes in periods 3 – 6.

Year 10

Students start their Year10 exams on Thursday 14th June. They will not be expected at school until 20 minutes before their scheduled exam.

NOTE: Students are still expected to attend their VET classes on 12 June and 13 June.

Examination Rules/Procedures

- All examinations are compulsory.
- If a student is sick on the day of an examination, parents are asked to notify the school and provide a medical certificate.

The examination will be rescheduled.

• Full school uniform must be worn.

What can I bring into the examination room?

- Pens, pencils, erasers, rulers in a clear plastic pocket if required. (NO PENCIL CASES)
- Bottled water clear un-labelled bottle.

 Materials as instructed by your subject teacher e.g. summary sheet for the Maths Exam.

(Any additional material, will be a breach of examination rules)

What I cannot bring into the examination room

- Mobile phones, IPads or other devices including Bluetooth.
- White out.
- Pencil cases.
- Additional material that could result in a breach of examination rules.

There are several measures that students and parents/guardians could perform that may help ensure success in study through this challenging period.

These include:

- Having a good study work space at home which is well lit with natural light and is comfortable for them. If they are using technology to study ensure that any form of social media is not in the background.
- The majority of learning happens inside the classroom, therefore students are strongly encouraged to use this time as effectively as possible.
- Students are encouraged to have an open dialogue with their teachers about their learning and approaches to studying.
- Healthy habits that include a healthy diet, exercise and good sleep patterns are also important.
- Asking your child each night how they are going with exam preparation and opening conversations with them.

If you would like support with this, please contact your child's homeroom teacher or year level leader.

We trust that students will be adequately prepared and wish them well with the exams.
